# Rob Jones - Locum Minister

It seems a long time since I started here in January and, in that time, winter has passed into spring and now early summer (cue: rain and cold!)

But I've been getting to know my way around Motherwell and I probably know it's streets and byways better now than some parts of Airdrie. My SATNAV is too old and unreliable to cope with the new M8 roundabouts, so I've had to rely on the old-fashioned A to Z, which is usually pretty good.

However, I'm quite good at getting lost and have spent several occasions wandering the backstreets and negotiating the speedbumps of Motherwell.

A bit like Abraham, I thought; Abraham whom we've been thinking about in our Sunday services recently; Abraham "the wandering Aramean", who must often have questioned where he was going – until he remembered that he was walking in the new land not on his own, but with God. And though his faith was tested and he sometimes failed, most of the time his faith won through. He was getting to know the place but more importantly, he was getting to know God.

And that goes for us too, in so many different circumstances, where our faith is tested and we also fail. Where life can be hard or confusing or just so busy. Whether we are new to a place or have lived here all our lives, this is what we are about – getting to know God, wherever we are. Like Abraham, we slowly learn to trust him for all our needs in all our circumstances. Sometimes it seems like two steps forward and one step back, but we just hang in there.

Abraham was caught up in God's eternal purpose that would one day be fulfilled in the Lord Jesus Christ.

The thing is: so are we. God is far bigger than we realise.

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## Kirk Session

Since the last issue of Kirk Matters a lot of the Kirk Session meetings have been taken up with matters relating to the Vacancy and the process of seeking a new Minister. We are delighted that the Nominating Committee has been elected and their work will be on going for some time to come. I would ask you to continue to pray for them during this time. I would also ask you to pray for our Locum, Rob Jones, as he leads us in worship each week and carries out pastoral work on our behalf during the Vacancy. His preaching of God's Word continues to inspire us and his hospital and home visits have been greatly appreciated.

We have received reports on visits to organisations including the Choir, Girls' Brigade, Boys' Brigade, Sisterhood and Guild and they are all thriving under excellent leadership.

The Congregational Records were attested by the Presbytery of Hamilton on 26th March. This involved the Kirk Session Minute Book, Congregational Board Minute Book, Baptismal Register, Property Register and Safeguarding Register all being examined by Presbytery to ensure our record keeping is done correctly. Once again, we were congratulated on the excellent standard of ours. Holy Week was particularly special for us this year as we hosted the Passion Play performed by Drama Kirk. This was an excellent performance bringing to life the time leading up to the crucifixion of Jesus and the Resurrection on Easter morning. It was wonderful to see the Sanctuary so busy for this event. Contrasting with that, we had the time of quiet reflection on Good Friday when our Sanctuary was open from 12.00noon to 3.00pm. We have a number of people from outwith the congregation who come along each year and join us for this time of reflection. On Easter morning we had early Communion at 9.30am and an All Age service of worship at 11.00am both conducted by our Locum, Rob.

A small group of Elders are looking at a new initiative, Asset Based Community Development which is an approach to "church" that is outside the traditional model. It encourages people to go into communities, find out what is happening there and how we can become involved and establish "church" in their community.

The Kirk Session will meet again before the Summer break and will come back refreshed in September as the beginning of another busy session for us all as we continue to serve the Lord.

# Finance Update

At the end of the first 3 months of 2019 I can advise that offerings have increased by £1,420 in comparison with the same period in 2018. Many thanks to all members who have increased their offerings.

Included in this increase were 'one off' Giftaid donations for £1000 (£1250 in total) and £160 (£200 in total) I also received another donation for £500 which will be included in April figures.

Several members are now also making 'one off' donations directly to our bank account in addition to their regular offerings – Our bank details are available on the standing order forms at the front and rear vestibules.

Many more members also now give by Giftaid with the result that the tax refund due from HMRC for the first 3 months of 2019 is the largest I have claimed for, valued at £4,825 .

Giving by Giftaid is a most important method of increasing our finances and I would encourage any members not currently giving this way, and paying any form of Income tax, to give by Giftaid. Giftaid forms are available at the front and rear vestibules.

In addition, the number standing orders have increased to 140 each month (about 170 members). Giving by standing order certainly helps with cashflow and again I would encourage anyone not giving by standing order to consider doing so. By using standing order there is also a small cost saving by not needing to purchase as many FWO envelopes. Standing order forms are also available at the front and rear vestibules.

It is Dalziel St. Andrew's policy, set by the Congregational Board, not to use monies left to the Church by way

of Legacies for General Expenditure and therefore the £9,000 of legacy cashflow used to meet the 2018 commitments to the Church of Scotland will be restored in full by the end of May.

Now that the vacancy process is underway it remains very important that we continue to see an improvement in our finances to give us the best opportunity of securing a new minister.

The requirement to restore the full value (£ 9,000) of legacy monies means that we are still likely to be short overall in our finances this year and the Congregational Board continues to seek to increase income and reduce expenditure so that by the end of 2019 our Finances will have returned to a positive position.

As I have mentioned there has already been a most positive, and very grateful, response to the request for members to review their level of giving, giving by standing order and giving by Giftaid.

- Giving by Standing order greatly improves cash flow and also ensures that if a member cannot attend regularly their Offering continues.
- Giving by Giftaid if tax (Income tax and/or tax on savings) is paid. Giftaid enables a further 25% of offerings to be reclaimed by way of a tax refund directly to the Church. Example: You donate £100 to the Church – the Church claims Gift Aid to make your donation £125






## Pastoral CARE

## Property Update

The completion of the work on replacing the large front door feature window did not quite mark the end of our construction activity. Over the years the stonework in the open bell tower part of the steeple had deteriorated with metal grilles falling off. A new contract was awarded to Freele and Beattie, who carried out the stonemason work on the large window, and thankfully all is now complete and the openings secure. (No more access for the pigeons!).

In addition a bush, which had been growing for a few years out of the upper section of the steeple, has now been removed with men abseiling down from the very top to access the bush. Not a job for the faint hearted! A detailed survey is in hand to make sure all other areas of the steeple are secure.

### Manse

Our manse was surveyed by the Presbytery Property Adviser to ensure it was ready to accept a minister as and when an appointment is made. All work has been successfully carried out and Presbytery has issued the relevant approval certificate. Thanks so much to those who carried out the tasks required both within the house and also in the garden area.

At the present time we have a number of positions within the congregation which require to be filled:



Brigaders bowling night is usually a laugh although, our team has never won, but they try hard and enjoy being with other girls from all over the Division.

Awards were handed out at parent and friends night on 29th May. Its great that the girls entertain for a while, break for a drink, and then enter Church where awards, prizes and gifts are laid out with their armband. When lists of girls are read out and their badges mentioned it was great this year to see girls with 1 years service many at 4,6, etc and older girls with 11 and 12 years service. That is dedication!



We are now on break over the summer, the cupboard has been cleaned out! we now can walk in! and hope all the parents who bring and collect have a relaxing time!


